Backpack and cargo pants belonging to an Afghan Hazara refugee who arrived in Australia by boat from Indonesia in 2010. He purchased the pack in Quetta en route to Australia, to carry his possessions on his journey. He arrived in Hobart in 2012. TMAG collection S2014.2 and S2018.59.



Prajit Parameswar came to Tasmania from Goa in India to study at the University of Tasmania in 2006.

That year, he used this BAS (Beat All Sport) cricket bat, made Jalandhar, Punjab, India, to score a century while playing for St Virgil's Cricket Club.

This sea chest belonged to **Olegas Truchanas and** came with him when he migrated to Tasmania from Lithuania in 1949. He came via a Baltic displaced persons camp in Germany where he had been since **1945.** Olegas became an advocate for the **Tasmanian environment** and a well-known photographer.
